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#### 5. Review of Coal Worker Health surveillance scheme

- Noted the update in the CWHSS.
- MSAC discussed how the project was to be closed off. The recommendations made are being implemented but the outcomes need to be outlined. Report to be provided with outcomes achieved against the recommendation.
- Recommendations 14 was agreed remains the most controversial and Professor Cohen held a meeting with the Steering Group 4 October 2024 and continues to work through the review outcomes. MSAC acknowledged that health/lung function monitoring still requires further work on understanding if those identified with reduced lung function was caused by workplace exposure and a clinical pathway is required to allow continuous monitoring. Further review is now required for those workers with reduced lung function irrespective of cause - this requires additional resourcing and collaboration. Professor Cohen's review of the inhalable dust thresholds remains critical for the underground operations.
- MSAC discussed further education for physicians is required for them to understand the complexities of the environment of the workers. Clear communication and continued education programs are required to remove current fear and panic that a diagnosis of reduced lung function can bring.
- Clear clinical pathways are in place and will require ongoing collaboration between Doctors, workers and employers to achieve suitable outcomes to return workers to work safely.

### 6. Adverse Vehicle Interaction Advisory Committee Progress Report

- MSAC thanked the members of the AVIAC.
- It was discussed that the process of investigation and analysis by the AVIAC has been well executed which led to the development of a training reference guide (TRG). 8.	Implementation of the proposed new WELFAC standards		
	<ul> <li>MSAC discussed and generally agreed with the views outlined in the discussion paper, including the concept of retaining or adopting overriding exposure standards in NSW legislation pertaining to mine sites.</li> </ul>		
	• MSAC discussed the exposure limits for diesel particulate matter (DPM) in NSW mines. The complexity of measurement to the proposed 0.01mg/m <sup>3</sup> limit means this level may not currently be achievable. The Council understood that 0.05mg/m <sup>3</sup> level has been adopted by other jurisdictions. The WELFAC standards do not differentiate between industries and don't account for the unique environment of underground mines or coal mines.		
	• MSAC agreed that 0.05mg/m <sup>3</sup> DPM should be the recommended standard applied to all coal mines and underground metalliferous mines. Discussions were held about further investigations that were required as to the feasibility of conducting measurements and the impact on regulating at the 0.01mg/m <sup>3</sup> DPM limit in order to determine the appropriate level for non-coal surface mines.		
	• MSAC discussed the timing of adopting the proposed limits, and it was generally agreed that the revised DPM limit of 0.05mg/m3 should be implemented prior to the 1 Dec 2026 timeframe.

	<ul> <li>Noted that Safe Work Australia has set a new DPM exposure limit of 0.01mg/m<sup>3</sup> TWA in the new WELFAC standards, coming into effect in December 2026.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>Noted Resources Safety and Health Queensland (RSHQ) has proposed to adopt a DPM exposure limit of 0.05mg/m<sup>3</sup> TWA for coal mines.</li> </ul>		
	• Noted that Safe Work Australia's proposal to reduce the respirable crystalline silica exposure limit to 0.025mg/m <sup>3</sup> TWA is currently open for consultation. MSAC noted that if SWA move to further reduce the limit then it would need to consider if the revised level is appropriate.		
	<ul> <li>Agreed that 0.05mg/m<sup>3</sup> DPM levels should be the recommended standard for all coal mines and underground metalliferous mines</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>Agreed to retain the existing overriding standard for carbon dioxide in NSW legislation for underground coal mines.</li> </ul>
