Overall this question was well-answered with a good understanding of incident notification and incident investigation process. Comments from candidates however suggested that completing the incident notification form took longer than expected.

This question was reasonably well-answered, although a more thorough understanding of the WHS legislation would have assisted the depth of answers.

Question 3 (total 25 marks)

9.5/25

Examiners comments

A poorly answered question due to a lack of detail provided in relation to managing risks associated with plant and a lack of reference to relevant legislation.

Question 4 (total 25 marks)

Average mark: 16.5/25

Examiners comments

A reasonably well-answered question demonstrating a fair knowledge of the hazards, controls and longer term recommendations for asset management and operation of a coal handling bin. A better understanding of high-risk activities as defined in the WHS (Mines and Petroleum Sites) Regulation would have improved the mark.

Question 5 (total 25 marks)

Examiners Comments

A well-answered question demonstrating a good working knowledge and practical application of MDG15. More detail around the administration systems required for equipment acceptance to site and ongoing management required for a more thorough response.

Question 6 (total 25 marks)

7.5/25

Average mark:

Examiners Comments

A very poor understanding of functional safety, safety critical systems, safety integrity level and CAT levels. Consequently, a poor understanding of the steps to establish functional safety requirements and to monitor and maintain it.

Question 7 (total 25 marks)

10.5/25

Examiners Comments

A reasonable attempt at listing the key statutory requirements to become familiar with shortly after commencing the role as the site mechanical engineer, however, a much poorer demonstration of expectations of these requirements and how to present these findings to the Mine Operator.
